<u>Grade 7/8 - The Great Escape</u> - On February 10 and 11 the grade 7/8 class from Canwood School went on a class trip through Moose Jaw and Regina. With this fundraising, they were able to ensure a very comfortable trip.

At 8:00 a.m. on Wednesday, February 10 students boarded a P.A. Northern bus and set off to Moose Jaw to tour the Tunnels of Moose Jaw.
