<u>The Saskatchewan Prevention Institute</u> - presents: "Hammered: A Sober Look at Youth & Alcohol" - a Youth Photovoice Exhibit

"Hammered" explores the impact of alcohol on Saskatchewan youth as viewed and experienced by the young people themselves. Photovoice is a technique that gives a "voice" to people whose voices are often unheard or ignored. 

10 NON-BOOK WAYS TO GET YOUR CHILD READING

- 1. Play board games. Scrabble or Boggle are specifically good for building vocabulary and spelling.
- 2. Collect trading cards. There are card series to appeal to most interests, from sports to space travel. Yu-Gi-Oh! to Beanie Babies.
- 3. Learn "how to." Is there something your child would really like to do, such as perform magic tricks or add sequins to her jeans? Encourage her to find out how by reading about it.
- **4. Get cooking**. Invite your child to help you bake a cake or a special meal together. If necessary, simplify and rewrite a recipe's instructions so he can read it to you.
- **5**. **Make cards**. Have your child make her own cards for holidays, birthdays, party invitations, and thank-yous. Help her write a personal message to each recipient.
- **6.** Create signs and labels. Help your early reader build his vocabulary by creating stickers or signs for his room that identify toys or furniture: "bike," "desk," etc.
- 7. Take a road trip. Write down travel directions and have your child serve as navigator when you drive. Give your co-pilot a map before you go, and ask her to mark the route according to the directions.
- 8. Put on a play. You can perform the play for a special celebration or family party. Help your child find an appealing script or create one together based on a favorite movie. Remind your child that he must memorize his lines by reading them over and over.
- 9. Write messages for your child. Even if you spend hours together in the same room, there are many reasons to write to your child. Drop a letter in her school bag or email her a joke she can forward to her friends. Post a list of chores on the refrigerator, and write family news or appointments on a wall calendar.
- 10. Host a scavenger hunt. Make a list of items that your child and his friends need to find inside your house or around the neighborhood. Provide written clues that lead to the treasures.

A Dozen Easter Egg Safety Tips

- Buy good eggs. Check the expiry date on the egg carton. Do not buy eggs that have expired or will expire before Easter.
- Keep everything clean. Wash your hands before and after handling eggs.
 Clean all utensils, countertops and other surfaces that your eggs will come in contact with.
- Check every egg in the carton for cracks, leaks or breaks. Throw out all broken or cracked eggs.
- Cook the eggs completely (hard-boiled). If an egg cracks during cooking throw it out. Do not decorate cracked or broken eggs
- Cool hard-boiled eggs quickly by running cold water over the eggs and refrigerate them immediately.
- If you plan to eat your decorated eggs make sure you color them using a non-toxic food due.
- Once you are finished decorating an egg place it in the refrigerator right away. Do not wait for all the eggs to be decorated before putting them back into the refrigerator.
- Store decorated eggs in the refrigerator until you are ready to hide them or eat them. If displaying your eggs is part of your Easter traditions, display your eggs in a bowl of ice. This will been the eggs cool.
- When hiding eggs choose the cleanest hiding places you can find. Keep the eggs away from dirty surfaces and pets.
- 10. Keep track of time. Make sure your decorating, hiding and hunting time do not exceed two hours. You may want to use one set of eggs for decorating and hunting and another for eating. You can also use plastic eggs for your Easter egg hunt instead of real ones. This will ensure that your eggs are not at room temperature for more than two hours.
- If eggs are left at room temperature for more than two hours they must be thrown away.
- Nothing lasts forever! Even hard-boiled eggs that have been refrigerated properly must be eaten or discarded within seven days of cooking.
