WELCOME BACK REMINDERS

<u>School Parking Lot and Student Safety</u> - Keeping students safe is a priority and we are asking for your assistance. After school, children may be walking between and/or behind parked cars on the way to their parent's vehicle where they can't easily be seen, or may be riding their bikes home after school. Wait to pull away from the school until students have made their way to their vehicles or down the street, and wait until the buses have left the parking lot. We need to do everything we can to avoid accidents, therefore, there will be teachers supervising this area while the



buses are loading. If you attempt to pull away before the buses have left you will be asked to wait. Thank you for your cooperation in helping us to provide a safe environment for our students.

**A reminder to all high school students: Please park your vehicles behind the power pole in our schoolyard, as it is hard for our buses to go around each other safely.

<u>Student Attendance</u> - Regular attendance is important for your child's academic success. Please try to schedule appointments outside of school hours whenever possible.

Please use Edsby to enter an absence for your child or call the school to inform us if your child will be absent or late. If your child is absent or late and we have not been notified, you will be contacted by the automated notification system.

If you pick your child up during the school day please use Edsby to enter an absence or notify the school office before they leave, Grade 7-12 students will have to sign out at the office.

Noon Hour - The school policy regarding students leaving the school premises at noon hour:

- *K-6 students living out-of-town are not permitted to leave at all. If there are exceptional circumstances, we must receive a letter or phone call from a parent/guardian.
- *Grade 7-9 students will be permitted to leave unless we get a letter from a parent/guardian stating they are not allowed to leave.
- *Grade 10-12 students are permitted to leave and are allowed to drive their vehicle.

<u>Allergen Awareness</u> - We have been a nut-free school for several years, please do not send any food or snacks to school that contain or may contain nuts. When in doubt when preparing lunches and snacks for your child, please click on the Anaphylaxis Information under the Safe Schools heading on the Sask Rivers Website, www.srsd119.ca. If you have any questions or require further information, please contact the school. Thank you in advance for careful attention in this area.

SCHOOL BUS SAFETY

- *Don't let children arrive at the bus stop too early. They may be tempted to wander or get into mischief. Make sure they come straight home—no detours.
- *Make sure children know what to do if they miss the bus: come back home; or if at school, report to a teacher—and **NEVER** accept a ride from a stranger.
- *If the stop is a long way from home, plan and discuss with your children where they can go in an emergency.
- *If it is dark on the way to and from the bus, make sure the children wear reflective clothing and they are visible
- *Make sure that the children wait well away from the road-way, and stay well back until the bus has come to a full stop and the door is open.

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*Explain to children they must walk at least 3 meters away when crossing in front of the bus so the driver can see them.

*Parents and motorists—watch for the red flashing signals and stop arm on the school bus. YOU MUST STOP.

Children, please follow these safety tips to make your school bus ride more enjoyable and safe for everyone on the bus:

- *Make sure the driver can always see you when you enter or exit the bus
- *Wait quietly in line—do not push or shove to get onto the bus
- *Don't throw things while on the bus
- *Don't yell or shout while riding the bus. Remain in your seat at all times.
- *Look both ways before you cross the road.

**A reminder to all students: If you are not going to be on your bus in the morning please call your bus driver and let them know the night before. If you are not able to contact the driver, call the place of pickup before yourself and ask them to tell the bus driver.



Did You Know? The FACTS about reading

Learning to read is <u>NOT</u> a natural process - reading must be taught.



Any student can have trouble learning to read, not just students with learning disabilities such as dyslexia.

literacy instruction to "build the reading brain."



All students learn to read at different rates because the acquisition of the foundational skills necessary for reading develop along a continuum (Moats 2020a, Seidenberg 2017). Some students require significantly more instruction than others to "crack the code" (Spear-Swerling 2022).

Learning to read continues long after Grade 3.



Once students are reading with fluency in later primary grades, reading instruction focuses on accurate decoding of complex multisyllabic words, morphology, spelling, building background knowledge, reading comprehension, and writing. Students are constantly learning to read and write with increasing ability well into high school, and beyond.

We all decode, or "get the words off the page," in the same way.

All readers learn to read by matching the symbols on the page to the sounds they represent and blending these sounds together to form words (Dehaene 2009, Moats 2020a).



Learning to read begins long before Grade 1.



Oral language, the foundation for learning to read, begins to develop the moment we are born. Print concepts (such as reading from left to right and from top to bottom on a page, in English) develop when adults read to children and explore books and other texts together in a print-rich environment. In kindergarten, formal literacy instruction includes developing an awareness of how words are made of sounds (phonemic awareness) and how those sounds are represented, in predictable ways, by letters (phonics).

We know how to teach reading so that close to 95% of children can become proficient readers.

Reading is the most studied cognitive process in humans. Reading is well understood within the fields of cognitive science, neuroscience, educational psychology, and speech-language pathology. When all students are taught to read using evidence-based methods, we can expect 95% of them to experience success (Moats 2020b).
