ADMINISTRATOR'S MESSAGE

November was a fast paced month. The volleyball season finished up with our senior girls hosting 1A Provincial Volleyball on November 21 and 22. Students, staff and community members volunteered countless hours to provide a very successful weekend. Thank you to W.P. Sandin School staff for helping out with the games that took place at their gym. Our mixed junior girls/boys' team competed hard right until the last spike when they competed in their P4A Extravaganza.

Congratulations to Joelle Hoeflicher, who was awarded the Governor General's Caring Canadian Award for her work with our Free the Children water project and her volunteer work in India with Me to We this past summer. Joelle was presented with this award at the Evening of Champions in Saskatoon on November 6. The award recognizes living Canadians and permanent residents who have made a significant, sustained, unpaid contribution to their community, in Canada or abroad. The Caring Canadian Award consists of a certificate and a lapel pin presented to recipients by the governor general or by lieutenant-governors, territorial commissioners, mayors or partner organizations.

We had a great turn-out for parent/teacher interviews with 85% of our families coming for a visit. Our School Book Fair coincided with parent/teacher interviews. Again, it was a huge success as children were seen purchasing books with the \$5.00 coupon from our School Community Council. The money raised is used to purchase new books for the library.

We had 25 representatives from Canwood go to Saskatoon and be part of WE Day. It was an inspirational day which charged our students with the task of making our world better. This year our student body will complete their water project in Ecuador and start a new project based on the Pillar of Empowerment. This involves collecting money to buy goats (\$50.00 each) which in turn will allow families a chance to sustain themselves.

On November 6, we hosted our annual Remembrance Day service. Thank you to Bob Thompson and the numerous people involved who made the day meaningful.

Basketball is about to begin with Mr. Duval hosting a clinic on Saturday, November 29. We are looking forward to the rejuvenation of our teams after a couple of years off.

INCLEMENT WEATHER-BUSING NEWS

Now that we are feeling the winter weather, we would like to make sure all parents are aware of our Cold/Inclement Weather Procedures. These procedures are in affect for both rural and urban bus routes.

The Transportation Office has two methods of communicating delays or cancellations of our buses:

- CKBI and CJVR radio stations receive all notifications, these stations will announce a list of our buses that are delayed or not running.
- Notifications will be placed on our website, www.srsd119.ca.

We do not phone individual homes to report bus cancellations.

We ask that you do not call the Transportation Office as we will be very busy managing the routes and ensuring the safety of the children on the buses.

Dressed for the season:

Students must dress appropriately for the weather. They must be dressed adequately for a 1 kilometre walk in case of an emergency. Our bus drivers have the authority to warn/educate a student on a first offense, and refuse transportation on the second.

ONGOING EVENTS

Dream Catcher Updates:

Grade 1/2 - The grade ones have been working on recognizing and representing numbers to 20. They have learned to do this in various ways; ten frames, pictures, numerals, number words and number lines. Students have a strong understanding of this concept. We have used re-teaching, flexible grouping and re-assessment to teach and track students' progress.

The grade two students have been studying the numbers to 100. Students have learned how to recognize, represent and order numbers from 1-100 using base ten blocks, place value charts, 100 charts, number sentences ex: (45+2=47) and number words. Grade twos have also learned about even and odd numbers. As with the grade one students we have used re-teaching, flexible grouping and reassessment to teach and track students' progress.

Grade 3/4 are working hard to achieve their Math learning outcomes. In Grade 3 the number outcomes include numbers up to 1000. The Grade 3s can represent and describe numbers to 1000 and compare and order numbers to 1000. We have started our new unit on adding 3 digit numbers with regrouping. The Grade 4 number outcomes include numbers up to 10,000. Students have achieved the outcomes of representing and describing numbers to 10,000 and comparing and ordering numbers to 10,000. Students also achieved proficiency in adding 4 digit numbers and subtracting 4 digit numbers. We are currently working on estimating addition and subtraction problems, by rounding numbers off. Various strategies have proven successful: the use of student whiteboards and markers so that I can see answers at a glance and give immediate feedback has been very useful. Partners have also practiced Math skills with many games that use dice and cards. Students love to use an online website "Study Ladder" in which I can assign specific tasks for students to accomplish. We are looking forward to using math apps on iPads as another way to practice skills. Math period is never dull! Way to go, Grade 3 and 4, on working hard on your achievements!

Grade 5/6 - We are currently working on our Number Strand. We have completed the following outcomes: Grade 5 - Numbers to 1,000,000, multiplication of whole numbers, division of whole numbers and estimation. Grade 6 - Place value, factors/multiples, order of operations and multiplication/division. Both grades are currently working on our fraction outcome. Please support your child by reviewing these concepts in a practical way in your home. If you have access to a computer and the

internet, these are a few excellent websites that may support the student's math skills:

Grade 7/8 - In Grade 7 the students are proficient in one numbers outcome thus far and we are working to complete more in the coming weeks. In N7.1 (divisibility rules) all of the students are either in green or blue after some re-teaching and re-testing. In N7.6 (integers) we are currently reteaching the unit for several students who were unable to achieve blue or green but will be re-tested shortly. There will be 4 more numbers strand, outcomes, that the students will have experience with in the unit, "Fractions, Decimals and Percent".

In Grade 8 the students are proficient in two numbers outcomes thus far and we are working to complete more in the coming weeks as well. In N8.1 (square and square roots) all of the students are either in green or blue after some re-teaching and re-testing. In N8.5 (multiply and divide integers) we were able to achieve green or blue on the first try. There will be 3 more numbers strand, outcomes, that the students will have experience with in the coming units.

Also in Dream Catcher, the Grade 7/8 class has begun working in flexible groups during Math. These are groups in which peers of similar ability in math spend time at different stations during class. The students are scheduled half hour time slots in which their small groupings will either work with the teacher, work individually, experience the technological sides of math, or finally, have time to experience different math games.

So far all students prefer this style of teaching math and it's mainly because all students are able to receive one on one help during teacher time. 100 percent of students voted for continuing with flexible groups.


